The Board of Health is authorized to make, adopt, promulgate, and enforce regulations pursuant to § 32.1-12. Code of Virginia §§ 32.1-122.5, 32.1-122.5:1, 32.1-122.6, and 32.1-122.6:01 requires the Board of Health to:

1. Award Virginia medical scholarships to medical students;
2. The Board of Health is proposing to amend the regulations for Virginia Medical Scholarship Program (12VAC5-530) to adhere to the style and form guidelines of the Virginia Registrar of Regulations. Amendments will ensure that the language is readable, clear, and consistent.

The regulations for Virginia Medical Scholarship Program are required by Virginia Code and there is continued need for them. No comments were received during the public comment period. The regulations are not complex, nor do they overlap with or duplicate any state/federal regulations. Technical amendments were made and effective in 2016. There has been no change in technology or other conditions since the 2016 regulatory action that would necessitate a substantive change to the Virginia Medical Scholarship Program or Regulations. The program administered by these Regulations promotes physician recruitment and retention, which is intended to address the primary care physician shortages throughout the Commonwealth. Facilities that provide primary care services and that qualify as a small business benefit from the implementation of the regulations, and the regulations have no adverse economic impact on small business.
